Registered Apprenticeship Facts



Nationally from 2014 to 2023, the number of registered active apprentices **grew by 103 percent**, from **317,805** to **643,447**



In Kentucky, registered active apprentices **more than doubled** to 6,698 in **2024** compared to **3,049** in 2014.



In Kentucky, the share of female apprentices has gone up from a low of three percent in 2015 to a high of 20 percent in 2023.



In Kentucky, apprenticeship completers continue to be employed at very high rates, even 10 years after program completion.



There are **290** Kentucky registered apprenticeship programs in **257** unique occupations as of July 1st, 2024.



Kentucky has been doing Registered Apprenticeship since 1942



Kentucky has approved apprenticeship occupations in Early Childhood Administration, K-12 Teacher, Software Developer, Library Technician and Real Estate Agent.

REGISTERED APPRENTICESHIP: A PROVEN WORKFORCE SOLUTION

Registered Apprenticeship Programs (RAPs) are:

- official, high-quality training programs that are led by the industry
- have a structure and content that is recognized by a national credential.
- training that combines related technical instruction (RTI), training on the job (OJT), and a progressive wage scale.

TYPES OF APPRENTICESHIP

Time-based Approach:

Measures skill acquisition through apprentice's completion of at least **2,000 hours** of on-the-job learning (OJT) and a minimum of **144 hours** of Related Training and Instruction

Competency based:

Measures skill acquisition through apprentice's successful demonstration of acquired skills and knowledge.

Hybrid:

Measures apprentice's skill acquisition through a **combination** of specified minimum number of hours of on-the-job learning and the successful demonstration of competency.

Hiring Incentives for Diversifying New Labor Pools Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC)

WOTC is a one-time federal tax credit* per employee that is available to employers for hiring and retaining recipients from the following specified target groups:

*Credit ranges from \$1,200 to \$9,600 depending on target group.

- Veterans
- Long-term Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) recipients
- Short-term TANF recipients
- SNAP (food stamp) recipients
- Designated community residents
- Vocational rehabilitation referrals
- Summer youth employee
- Ex-felons
- Long-term unemployed individuals
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients

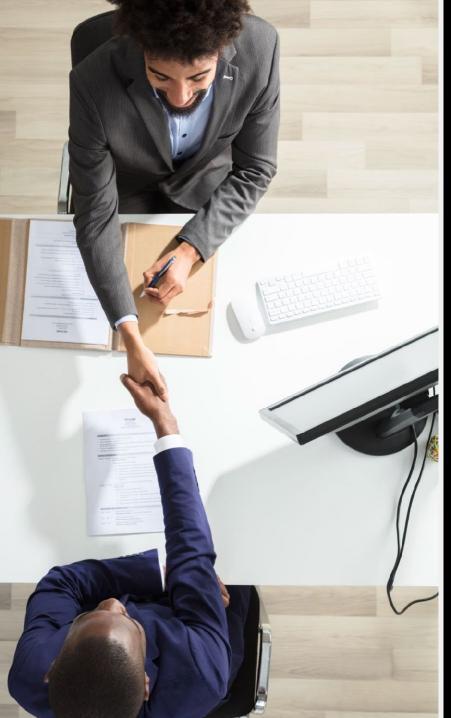






- Fidelity bonds are issued in increments of \$5,000 up to \$25,000 total and are free-of-charge to both employer and employee
- Coverage is for the first six months of a selected individual's employment; opportunity to extend another 6 months is available
- No special application form for a job seeker to complete
- No bond approval process
- No follow-up or required termination actions
- No deductible in bond insurance amount if employee dishonesty occurs
- The minimum age requirement is 16
- Bonds over \$5,000 are possible after review
- Bonds can be applied to:
 - any job in any state,
 - any full-time, part-time or temporary employee paid wages with federal taxes automatically deducted from pay.
