Serve Kentucky – Who we are

- The state service commission was established in 1994, by the National and Community Trust Act of 1993.
- Serve as the conduit for federal funds that support programming.
- The work of the Commission is carried out by staff in grant, programming, and financial fields.
- We have up to 25 Governor appointed commissioners who volunteer their time to help us further the mission.
- We receive some funding from the General Assembly, but the largest source of funding is, AmeriCorps.





Serve Kentucky – What we do

We have two annual grant funding competitions

- The competitive process, is one in which the federal agency determines what grants to fund.
 - Typically occurs from October to January.
- The formula process is one in which Serve Kentucky is given a designated amount to distribute through a state grant competition.
 - Typically occurs from February to May.
- Funds are distributed through the state system via invoicing.
- The commission is also tasked with oversight and monitoring of all funds and programming.





Serve Kentucky – By the numbers 2023

 - 2 Public Health AmeriCorps
 - 7 competitive
 - o 10 formula

- 1,090 member slots
- \$14 million in federal funds
- \$5.8 million in matching funds

- 2 Healthy futures
- 2 Public Health Corps
- 6 Planning grants Time to explore what an AmeriCorps program could be.





AmeriCorps Programs – What they do

- Education Reading or math tutoring, mentoring, college access, after school programming.
 - 2 professional corps training teachers
- Environmental education, disaster mitigation and urban renewal.
- Economic Opportunity Housing services for insecurely housed or unhoused folks, repairs, improvement and builds.
- Healthy Futures Senior support, food security and addiction recovery.
- Public Health Senior living, hospitals, health department (WIC, Hands, Harm Reduction).
- Planning grants possible focus, veterans, education, healthy futures, economic opportunity.

AmeriCorps Programs – Workforce by nature

- A 2008 study confirms AmeriCorps is workforce.
- 46% go on to public service jobs (33% comparison group).
- 37% now work in the government sector (27% comparison group).
- 24 % work in non-profits (23% comparison group).
- 47% of members indicated AmeriCorps gave them job connections.
- 79% report that their AmeriCorps gave them exposure to new career options.
- 70 % indicated that the education award was a factor in serving, so they could complete their education, thus improving job prospects.





AmeriCorps Programs – Workforce by design

- Public Health Corps is offering Community Health Worker credentials during service.
- Family Scholar Houses Corps offers structured apprenticeships for CNA's and members train in positions as Direct Support Professionals and Dietary support.
- The Professional Teacher Corps Members complete a Master of Education and or agree to serve as a teacher for two years.
- Environmental Education Corps offers an accredited certification by the National Association for Environmental Education.
- Southeast Conservation Corps offers pre-apprenticeship training and certifications in resource stewardship, (fire management, chainsaw training, etc.). disaster mitigation and response.





Kentucky AmeriCorps Outcomes

- Beneficiary outcomes provide the greatest impact of AmeriCorps in Kentucky, this is our primary effort.
- We track the amount of money that comes to Kentucky through AmeriCorps funding and education awards.
- We feel that a secondary impact could be workforce outcomes.
- We want to explore opportunities for additional funding of programs that include credentialling, certifications, pre-apprenticeships or apprenticeships, etc.
- Can workforce funds be used a match on a federal AmeriCorps grant?





AmeriCorps Workforce – What we can do better

- Tracking the service outcomes of members.
 - What they go on to do after service
 - How many report getting jobs in their field or in a new field.
- Help identify ways our programs can offer pre-apprenticeships, apprenticeships or other certifications.
 - What types are possible.
 - What are the requirements?
 - Make the right connections to explore or implement.





Hurdles we encountered

- Staff capacity to research.
- Lack of understanding about credentialing or resources.
- Buy-in from the programs.
- Difficulty determining how to meet all apprenticeship requirements.
