CALL TO ORDER AT 10:32AM

Sara Tracy, Chair

LaKisha Miller and Jacob McAndrews introduced Sara Tracy, the new chair of the Sector Strategies subcommittee. Sara is the Talent Pipeline System Director for the Kentucky Chamber Workforce Center and is excited by the work the committee has begun working on. LaKisha will continue participating in the committee as much as her schedule permits and is sad to step down, but excited to see the direction Sara takes the committee.

Key Sector Evaluations

Stefanie Ebbens-Kingsley (KWIB) and Scott Secamiglio (KYSTATS) explained the plan to reevaluate the 5 Key Sectors identified by the KWIB. These sectors were identified in 2011 and have not been updated since. A working group will be formed from the Sector Strategies subcommittee to determine if these five key sectors still fit, identify the occupational groups and industries under each sector, and make any other recommendations to the full board at the March 17th meeting. A spreadsheet with the occupational groups and statistics will be sent to the full committee.

Lindsey Trent, Kris Williams, Johnny Pittman, Matt Bacon, and Rick Smith all expressed interest in joining this working group.

Good Jobs Challenge Update

The Good Jobs Challenge grant proposal deadline has been pushed back two weeks. The current Executive Summary will be sent to the committee as an informational read. Any questions regarding the grant can be directed to Stefanie Ebbens-Kingsley.

Work-Based Learning Employer Toolkit Discussion

Johnny Pittman spoke on the discussions his committee (OY/YA) have been having in this area. There is a strong need/demand from employers for a toolkit like this if it is done well. There is a steep learning curve for employers when it comes to WBL and the easier we can make it the more will participate. Engaging employers in the creation of the toolkit is key.

Julie Whitis, a principal in Northern Kentucky, has been working with the NK WIB to create a standardized format for their internships. She will be presenting that to the local WIB in February and is willing to share their template with the committee at the next meeting. This could be a great launching point for a statewide toolkit.

Lindsey Tent mentioned that the popular notion is that students need to be 18 to participate. However, there are laws and protections that allow younger students to participate. Johnny Pittman noted that may be true, but most employers require them to be 18. Can we get OEAS or another entity to come and explain the protections in place for minors in the workplace? That could be a crucial part of the toolkit.

Employers, educators, and workforce staff all refer to WBL by different names with different expectations. While a registered apprenticeship is rigidly defined, terms like internship, co-op, or clinicals all have different connotations depending on who you talk to. A glossary of terms is critical to get everyone on the same page.

Next Steps:

- Work-Based Learning Toolkit
 - Sara and the KWIB staff will set up a joint meeting between the Sector Strategies and
 Opportunity Youth/Young Adults subcommittees. This meeting is tentatively set for February
 11th.
 - KWIB staff will reach out to the Office of Employer and Apprenticeship Services to see if one of their team members will serve on the committee. They will also connect with OLLS and David Horseman with KDE to see if they could attend and speak at the joint meeting.
 - Gather a compendium of definitions used to refer to Work-Based Learning opportunities by different federal, state, and local agencies. The overlap of definitions is something we have to overcome if we are to be successful.
- Key Sector Working Group
 - KWIB staff will reach out to those interested to provide documentation, a timeline, and assistance as needed.
